A letter from Bishop Christopher to those moving to senior school

I'm going to start my letter by asking you what might seem like a strange question. It's this: what have you learned while you've been at school?

You might think the answer is obvious! After all, you've learned so much about lots of things – reading, writing, sport, art, music, history, geography – the list goes on and on. However, it's not the whole story, because while you've been at school you've learned a lot more besides.
